The purpose of the biennial Mennonite Church USA Convention is to empower the church to achieve its vision, purpose and mission.

Key Objectives

- 1. To gather representatives of the whole church for worship, fellowship, learning, discernment and decision-making.
- 2. To build Mennonite Church USA vision, identity and capacity to join God's mission in the world.
- 3. To worship Jesus as the center of our faith; to embody community as the center of our lives; to embrace reconciliation as the center of our work.
- 4. To share the biblical story through an Anabaptist lens.
- 5. To provide resources to help all participants carry out God's mission.
- 6. To serve as a witness to the host community.
- 7. To create an opportunity for all parts of Mennonite Church USA to gather regardless of race, ethnicity or socioeconomic status.

Key Components

The adult gathering and Delegate Assembly will:

- 1. Encourage congregations to call, empower and bless their delegates to participate in the churchwide process of discernment and ministry.
- 2. Provide a forum for the members of Mennonite Church USA to hear from and give counsel to Mennonite Church USA agencies and ministries.
- 3. Create an environment for the Delegate Assembly to function effectively and efficiently on behalf of the church.
- 4. Welcome and interact with representatives of sister churches.
- 5. Provide opportunities for discipleship and spiritual growth by nurturing a strong Mennonite identity through an understanding of what it means to live out our faith as Mennonite Anabaptists.

The junior youth and youth gatherings will:

- 1. Invite youth to make and strengthen their commitments to Christ.
- 2. Nurture a strong Mennonite identity through an understanding of what it means to live out our faith as Mennonite Anabaptists.

Young adult gatherings will:

- 1. Provide opportunities for young adults to gather together and resource one another.
- 2. Provide opportunities for Mennonite Church USA leaders to learn from and hear the voices of young adults that will help the church in its mission.
- 3. Provide opportunities for young adults to learn about the ministry opportunities and governance structures in Mennonite Church USA.

The children's gathering will:

Foster safe and age-appropriate activities that encourage spiritual and relational growth while allowing their parents to fully engage in the Mennonite Church USA convention.

Shared Expectations for Convention Attendees

As planners, we want convention to be safe and enjoyable for all our attendees, and we are counting on everyone who comes to convention to help make this possible. While we may not always agree with one another, we should always treat each other with respect. Have a question but aren't near the Info Booth? In order to make convention as positive of an experience as possible for everyone, here are some of our expectations for all convention attendees:

Convention attendees should not engage in language or behavior that threatens the safety or personhood of another convention attendee. This includes racist speech, hate speech, threats, sexual harassment and any other behaviors that could be understood as threatening. We will not tolerate hate speech or harassment based on sexual or gender identity or directed at LGBTQ participants. If you are a victim of language or behaviors like this at convention, please report the offense to the convention office.

- Blocking of hallways, fire exits and points of egress is prohibited at all times. Gatherings that in any way violate fire code regulations will be dispersed.
- No literature (fliers, brochures, handouts, books, etc.) may be passed out beyond the Exhibit Hall area. Seminar and workshop leaders can distribute handouts as necessary during their session.
- No promotional materials may be hung on convention center walls without the written approval of Mennonite Church USA Convention Planning staff. This includes posters, postcards, pictures, etc.
- Disagreements should be resolved peacefully. In any and all disagreements, we ask that you treat your conversation partners with the respect they deserve as beloved children of God.
- Respect the instructions of Convention Planning staff and volunteers on-site. We are here to serve you and to help make convention a good experience for everyone in attendance. If you have a disagreement or complaint about the behavior of staff or a volunteer, please come to the Convention Planning office to report it.

Audio and Video Recording

Please be aware that by entering the Kansas City Convention Center, by registering for the Mennonite Church USA convention or by participating in Mennonite Church USA convention activities (also known as MennoCon19), you consent to your voice, name and/or likeness being used, without compensation, in films and tapes for use in any and all media, whether now known or hereafter devised, for eternity, and you release Mennonite Church USA, its successors, assigns and licensees from any liability whatsoever of any nature. Also note that as parents or guardians you are also consenting to the filming and recording of your minor children who participate in MennoCon19 activities or who enter contracted property. Do not enter MennoCon19 event areas and contracted properties if you do not wish to be subject to the foregoing. You may want to leave areas during video and audio recording if you do not wish to be filmed.

Children's Programming

The children's program at MennoCon19 is sure to be one that engages the mind and body as children will be active in their own convention experience. Children can expect to engage in biblical storytelling, music making, community building, creation making and partaking in recreation activities of all sorts. Children will also have an opportunity to do their own service project in Kansas City and take a special field trip around the city. The list can go on and on as the week will be filled with the many ways we can and are walking with Jesus. Programming will take place from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. with a break in between from 11:45 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. for lunch. Parents are responsible to pick up their children and take them to lunch. **Daily Check-in** will be located on the first level (1501) and will start at 8:00 a.m. For security reasons, children will need to be checked in and checked out each session.

Preschool-Grade 5 Activities will take place on the first level in room 1501 A&B.

Infant/Toddler Care will take place in room 1501 C.

Evening childcare is available for infant/toddlers in the children's area. Evening sessions: 7:15 to 9:00 p.m., Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Family Bouncin' Dance Party will give families an opportunity to spend time together. There will be a number of fun options including bounce house fun on Wednesday evening, July 3, from 4:00 to 7:30 p.m. in the children's area.

In case of emergency or evacuation, children should be picked up in the main lobby of the Crowne Plaza, located a block away from the convention center.

Nursing room

We have designated Show Office 2501B (just outside the worship hall) as a space for nursing mothers. This room is available from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Use a light knock to alert anyone already in the room that you are entering.

Emergency and Medical Information

First Aid: The first aid room is located just outside Exhibit Hall D. KC Medical has been contracted during normal daytime/evening hours. For a medical emergency, summon help by phoning the security operations center at 816-513-5111 or contacting event security. Report the emergency, giving location, if possible, and other details. House security will call 911. Stay with the injured/ill person until house security arrives. House security will coordinate the arrival of the Kansas City Fire Department and will also guide emergency medical staff to the location of the injured person. The Kansas City Convention Center is equipped with a sufficient number of first aid stations. Event and house security guards are trained and equipped as first responders to medical emergencies and can provide minor first aid. House security guards are certified in administering the automatic external defibrillator.

Parents are especially invited to attend any seminar, as many seminars will be relevant to parenting.

Junior Youth

Junior youth activities will take place in 2215C at the convention center. Junior youth can be dropped off on Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday at 8:00 a.m. Programming ends at 5:30 p.m. each evening. Parents and youth sponsors will pick up their junior youth at 5:30 p.m. Junior youth will eat together for lunch every day, so it is not necessary for sponsors or parents to pick them up for lunch.

The junior youth program will include a variety of activities. The group will meet each morning and spend the day together. Junior youth will worship with everyone each morning and evening. Between those times they will dig deeper into Scripture, participate in a servant project and spend time in both the Rec Hall and Exhibit Hall. The junior youth participants will have great opportunities to spend time with other junior youth from across the denomination and grow closer in their walk with Christ.

In case of **emergency or evacuation**, the junior youth can be picked up in the lobby area of the Crowne Plaza hotel.

Lost and Found

The lost and found is located at the Information Booth.

Meals

Meals will be served in the dining hall (Exhibit Hall C). Lunch is included for everyone who registered under the early or regular registration rate. To help with traffic flow, we are asking adults to proceed to lunch right after worship while youth groups spend time in their small groups.

For those who purchased dinners, you will find meal tickets in your registration packet. There is a separate meal ticket for each meal purchased. Please treat your meal tickets like cash. They cannot be replaced if lost or stolen. To get new tickets, you must pay for the cost of the meals. You must show your meal ticket to be admitted into the dining hall (Exhibit Hall C). Hours for lunch are 11:30 a.m-1:30 p.m. Hours for dinner are 5:30-7:00 p.m.

Menno Commons

Are you looking for a comfortable space to relax, fellowship or catch up with friends? Come visit Menno Commons. This area will be available for anyone to come take a break, meet with a friend or enjoy some music amidst a busy convention week. The stage will feature the Menno Nite of Music, Menno-It-All and several musical dramas. This area is located in the 2300 Lobby of the convention center.

Morning Activities

Several activities have been planned to help start your day right!

- Gather for Zumba, a fast-paced, dance-inspired workout led by Jill Schlabach, certified instructor. Meet in the Recreation Hall at 7:00 a.m. to start your day by getting your blood flowing.
- Join others from your hotel for a morning run. Meet in the lobby at 6:30 a.m. and head out in small groups depending on the distance you want to cover that day.
- Stop by the Prayer Tent each morning for a time of prayer. Morning Prayers for Peace take place at 8:00-8:20 a.m. Prayers will be led by the prayer team and various volunteers. The tent is located in the Grand Ballroom Lobby.

Offerings

We will have two worship services where offerings will be received to support Peace Academic Center and peace church planting within MC USA.

• Peace Academic Center

The Peace Academic Center, formally known as the Hopi Mission School, has reopened with a new vision in partnership with the Hopi churches and community. The center is currently offering a GED program and plans to open a preschool in the near future. The new name of the academic center reflects the desire of the churches on the reservation to engage more with our peace theology, which speaks to the Hopi's long-standing peace position. As Mennonites, we have been engaged with the Hopi since the 1920s, and we are asking you to once again support this vital educational work with prayer, volunteers and financial resources.

Peace Church Planting

The church was born at Pentecost and spread throughout the world through what we might call church planting today. Apostolic leaders, with a vision to spread the good news of Jesus, launched faith communities near and far (you can read their story in Acts). There is still a need for leaders to launch new faith communities today. MC USA supports people who are called to such work in the United States. One form that takes is tangible support for church planters as they seek training for their work. This offering will go towards helping church planters in MC USA access training, like the Sent Network developed by Mennonite Mission Network, and church planting grants.

Prayer Ministry

Visit the MennoCon19 Prayer Tent located in the lobby of the 2500 Ballroom. It will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. each day.

Tents in the biblical narrative represent many things: a temporary home, a place of hospitality, a place to encounter God. As we gather in Kansas City for this week set apart for our denomination, the prayer ministry team welcomes you to visit the Prayer Tent as a place of hospitality where you are invited to encounter God. Come to pray alone, bring others to accompany you in prayer or receive prayer from a Prayer Team member. Structured activities are available for you to commune with God in prayer, as well as spaces for unstructured prayer.

The prayer team intends for the Prayer Tent to be a safe and accessible space that honors the dignity and worth of all convention attendees.

Structured times for prayer in the Prayer Tent are planned as follows:

Morning Prayers for Peace, led by Rod Stafford – **8:00-8:20 a.m.** A liturgy of Scripture, sharing, prayers and music will focus on the following daily themes:

- Wednesday: Prayers for peace in the wake of violence against Jews, Muslims, and Christians in their sacred places of worship around the world
- Thursday: Prayers for peace on behalf of Mennonite Central Committee peace workers in Palestine and Israel
- Friday: Prayers for peace as cries for dignity and displays of loving kindness arise in Gaza amidst suffering and endless warfare
- Saturday: Prayers for peace in Jerusalem following Jesus' lament in Luke 13

Midday Prayers, led by Prayer Team members – **1:00-1:20 p.m.** Come as individuals or groups to bring your joys and burdens to God alongside members of the prayer team. Anointing is also available during this time.

Evening Prayers for Our Church, led by Sarah Bixler and Hendy Stevan Matahelemual – **7:00-7:20 p.m.** A liturgy of scripture, sharing, prayers and music will focus on the following daily themes:

- Tuesday: Anticipating God's movement among us
- Wednesday: Follow Jesus
- Thursday: Witness to God's peace
- Friday: Experience transformation

The prayer team consists of adult and youth members. Members of the Prayer Team are wearing black and white polka dot ribbons on their name tags so you can identify them. Prayer coordinators:

- Hendy Stevan Matahelemual, pastor of Indonesian Light Mennonite Church in Philadelphia

Recreation Hall

The Rec Hall is located in Hall B. Pickleball, Cornhole and Gaga Ball are offered. There will also be volleyball and basketball, Ping-Pong, four square, soccer games, badminton, table games and an area for younger children. For a complete listing of activities and specific times of events, go to the recreation info table (in the Recreation Hall).

- When you check out a ball, Ping-Pong paddle or other equipment, be prepared to leave an item as a deposit until you return the equipment – for example, your cell phone, ID or watch.
- We will hold Rec Hall lost and found items at the info table for the day. At closing each night, we will take all items to lost and found at the convention Information Booth.

Servant Projects

When you arrive at convention, you will need to check in at the servant project office, located in room 2211. There you will receive information about any changes that may have occurred since you received your confirmation email and the location for servant project orientation. If your servant project is on Tuesday morning, check in at the servant project office between 1:00 and 5:00 p.m. on Monday and be in your orientation room by 8:15 a.m. If your servant project is on Tuesday afternoon, check in at the servant project office between 9:30 a.m. and 12:15 p.m. and be in your orientation room by 12:25 p.m. If you are scheduled to serve Wednesday or Friday, check in at the servant project office no later than the day before you are scheduled to serve. On the day of your servant project, be in your orientation room by 12:20 p.m.

Servant project orientations are an important time to set the tone for your service experience. You will also meet your group leader there. Your group leader will get you on the right bus, to the right agency and connected with your local hosts when you arrive at your service location. The group leader will also make sure you get back to the convention center on time. If you are a sponsor whose children will be part of the children's activities, you may need to find alternative child care for lunch on the day of your servant project. The children's program takes a break for lunch, and your servant project orientation will overlap with this break. Please be sure that you identify someone to pick up and care for your children during this time and let the children's convention staff know about this change.

Here Is the Church, Here Is the Steeple ... But Where Are All the People? Understanding the Shifting Religious Landscape

We have all seen the numbers about religious disengagement. They're alarming and concerning. Too often, however, we don't approach these numbers with the appropriate context. In this presentation, Dr. Josh Packard, director of The Dechurched Project, combines original research from his book, Church Refugees, to help shift perspectives to understand religious disengagement accurately so we can craft solutions that work.

Josh Packard, PhD, is a sociologist, professor and researcher at the University of Northern Colorado, where he serves as the executive director of the Social Research Lab.

Participants learn strategies to reduce and prevent conflict, including listening to and respecting other points of view, sharing their own ideas respectfully, and seeing differences as strengths, not weaknesses. Come hear stories from Peace Clubs in Africa and learn how to lead activities and access resources to implement Peace Clubs with the children in your communities and churches.

"Forbearance" has become almost exclusively associated with how we deal with differences over human sexuality. At other times in our faith family's life, it was church discipline, women

in church leadership, whether to participate in the military or whether to pay taxes going to the military, that tested our ability to walk together as the body of Christ. Some are suspicious that forbearance is a fancy term for tolerating what is indefensible, while others see its value precisely in relation to inclusion and tolerance. Others suspect it as buying time or delaying making hard decisions. But there are those who see forbearance as core to relationships within the body of Christ. In this seminar, we will explore forbearance biblically, and we will discover that it requires of us every ounce of faith, hope and love. It demands a radical commitment to peace, only now within the family of faith. While easily confused with a kind of cool tolerance and respect for individual autonomy, forbearance is nothing other than suffering each other in hope, the exercise of patient love. That is how we walk together as one body into the fullness of Christ.

"Gathered into One"

This is the title of delegate equipping times that will be lead by Tom Yoder Neufeld. Through the lens of Ephesians, we will explore the unity of the Spirit, the "wind of God" that blows together those who are often at odds, even hostile to each other, transforming them through the self-giving and recreating Christ into the one body of Christ. The creator of all is a collector, gatherer, reconciler, re-creator—a uniter of "all things," and thus of all and each of us in all our beautiful and also often flawed and conflict-laden diversity. Ephesians 1:10 refers to God's peacemaking in and through Christ as "gathering up all things in (and through) Christ." The implications of that for the church, and thus for us as an Anabaptist community, are nothing if not challenging. The church is truest to its calling when it reflects exactly that scandalously hospitable and radically transforming diversity. The peace of Christ is a perfectly messy peace, demanding of us who live this unity humility, mutual respect, patience, and forbearance – in short, love. To be a peace church starts at home, and is tested there as much as or more than anywhere else.



Tom Yoder Neufeld is professor emeritus of Religious Studies (New Testament), having taught at Conrad Grebel University College at the University of Waterloo from 1983 to 2012. He and his spouse, Rebecca Yoder Neufeld, live in Waterloo, Ontario, Canada, where they are fully engaged in the life of their congregation, First Mennonite Church, in Kitchener, Ontario. Tom grew up in Europe where his parents were missionaries. He graduated with a B.A. in History from the University of Manitoba, and a Master of Divinity and Doctor of Theology from Harvard Divinity School. He has served as a hospital and prison chaplain in Winnipeg, and a pastor in northern Manitoba Boston. Tom has served the larger church on

the Christian Formation Council of Mennonite Church Canada, and represented Mennonite Church Canada on the General Council of the Mennonite World Conference (MWC), serving also on MWC's Faith and Life Commission. He serves now as chair of that commission, as well as chair of the dialogue between the Mennonite World Conference and the World Communion of Reformed Churches. A frequent speaker in seminar and conference settings, his teaching has taken him beyond North America to Europe and Asia. Tom's best known scholarly work is his commentary on Ephesians (BCBC, 2002), Recovering Jesus: The Witness of the New Testament (2007), and Killing Enmity: Violence and the New Testament (2011).

- 3. Please announce your name and table number when you come forward to speak.
- 4. Remember each table can only come up once to speak.
- 5. Read the question(s) you are responding to.

God calls us to be followers of Jesus Christ and, by the power of the Holy Spirit, to grow as communities of grace, joy and peace, so that God's healing and hope flow through us to the world.
